Instructions for Authors

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Aims and Scope

EJOSSAH is dedicated to promoting fresh scholarly enquiry on Ethiopia and the Horn of Africa. It is devoted to empirical and analytical research and its application in social sciences and humanities. The journal publishes original research articles, literature reviews, book reviews, short communications, obituaries, and conference papers.

Originality

EJOSSAH publishes articles based on original research using primary empirical data, including surveys, in-depth interviews, key informant interviews, focus group discussions (FGD), archives, newspapers, and government and non-governmental organisation documents, or articles developed using secondary data. In the latter case, the author should clearly outline their fresh or new contribution or a new reinterpretation of the existing literature.

Submissions must be original and must not have been previously published or be under consideration for publication elsewhere. The simultaneous submission of a manuscript to multiple journals is unethical and will result in rejection.

Language

All submissions must be written in English. Authors are strongly advised to have their manuscripts proofread prior to submission.

Manuscript Length

Word limits are inclusive of references.

Research articles: 4,500–7,500 words including abstract and references.

Book reviews and short communications: maximum 2,500 words

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Contributions should be submitted online via the journal's ScienceOpen collection page.

Manuscript Preparation

Formatting

Manuscripts should be prepared in Times New Roman throughout. Font sizes should reflect the hierarchical structure of the text: 14pt for the manuscript title, 12pt for primary section headings, 11pt for secondary section headings, and 11pt for body text.

First Page

The first page should contain the manuscript title, abstract, and keywords only. The abstract should not exceed 250 words and should convey the manuscript's principal argument and findings. Keywords should follow the abstract and reflect the manuscript's content.

Structure

The body of the manuscript should be divided into a maximum of three or four sections. Depending on the nature of the research, manuscripts may be structured as follows:

Quantitative research

- Introduction/Background — presenting the rationale, problem statement, research methods, and a brief overview of the article.
- Methods — describing what was done and how, justifying the design, sample size, and sampling procedures, and explaining how results were processed to answer the research question.
- Results — presenting the findings of the researcher(s) after data analysis, including any significant patterns or insights from the raw data.
- Discussion — interpreting, analysing, and explaining the results, placing them in the context of the entire study, and addressing the study's limitations.
- Conclusion — synthesising the essential findings and, where relevant, making recommendations or identifying areas for future research.

Qualitative and mixed-methods research

Authors using qualitative and mixed-methods approaches may organise the body of the article using one of the following structures:

- Chronological — organising material in chronological order to explain historical processes and developments.
- Comparative — selecting major themes or issues used for comparison of cases and structuring the article accordingly.
- Thematic — identifying themes broadly representative of the issues addressed in the research and structuring the article accordingly.

Quotations

EJOSSAH adheres to the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA Style), 7th edition. Direct quotations of more than 40 words should be indented 0.5" from both sides of the margin as a block quotation. Direct quotations of fewer than 40 words should be incorporated into the text in inverted commas.

Tables and Figures

Tables and figures should be numbered consecutively in the order of their appearance in the manuscript. Each table and figure must have a descriptive caption. Captions for tables are placed above the table; captions for figures are placed below. Where possible, place tables and figures within the text at appropriate points rather than at the end of the manuscript. Sources for all tables and figures must be acknowledged. All table formats should conform to APA Style 7th edition.
